Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Peterhouse Conferences and Events Limited (the 'Company') for the year ended 30 June 2020, which comprise the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings, the Balance Sheet and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

1. General information

Peterhouse Conference and Events Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated under the number 09106185 in England and Wales, United Kingdom. The address of the registered office is The Bursary, Peterhouse, Trumpington Street, Cambridge, CB2 1RD. The principal activity of the company continued to be that of conferencing and events.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The functional currency of the Company is GBP and the level of rounding applied is to the nearest £.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Going concern

The director has considered the effects of COVID-19 on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern as conference activity has been cancelled for the foreseeable future. Accordingly both income and expenditure will reduce in the company and a letter of support has been received from Peterhouse to confirm that it will help the company to meet any day to day obligations as they fall due for a period up to 31 December 2021. The director therefore believes that the company is a going concern and the accounts can be prepared on a going concern basis as it will continue in existence for at least 12 months from the date of signing the accounts.

2.3 Turnover

Turnover is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the turnover can be reliably measured. Turnover is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. Turnover is generated from the supply of conferences and is recognised on completion of the conference.

2.4 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

2.5 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment.

2.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.7 Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

2.8 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price.

2.9 Deed of covenant distribution

Deed of covenant payments to Peterhouse, the parent company, are treated as a distribution rather than an expense in the financial statements. Where a deed of covenant has been entered into by the parent and subsidiary, the obligation is recognised in line with the deed for the profits to be paid over in the year that they are earned.

3. Judgments in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believe to be reasonable under the circumstances. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of the amount, events or actions, actual results ultimately may differ from those estimates.
